Strengthening logistics transport capacity and supply chains in Africa

The World Food Programme (WFP) is the world's largest humanitarian organization, saving lives in emergencies and using food assistance to build a pathway to peace, stability and prosperity for people recovering from conflict, disaster and the impact of climate-related shocks.

Supporting WFP to achieve its mandate is its vast Supply Chain function, which consists of over **4,745 employees** worldwide, working across planning and procurement, through to shipping, logistics, aviation, and delivery assurance to ensure that the right assistance reaches the right people, while providing support to the wider humanitarian community as needed. In 2023, we delivered **3.6 million mt** of food and supported **762 partners.**

WFP's Global Fleet is key to the organization's supply chain operations. Led by a team based in WFP's Rome HQ and supported by three regional logistics hubs, Global Fleet comprises **1,500 vehicles** deployed to 16 countries – including major emergencies such as northern Ethiopia and Afghanistan.

PROJECT OUTLINE

Leveraging its extensive expertise and decades of experience in fleet management, WFP's Global Fleet team has been providing strategic technical support and trainings since 2012, training more than 300 WFP and government employees in transport best practices with the assistance of private sector partners. A particular focus of this work has been in East and West Africa where the transport sector faces significant challenges.

That's why WFP is working with leading global companies to develop an innovative public-private partnership that aims to:

- Build a dedicated transport training centre to deliver face-to-face and online trainings in Ghana and other
 countries in East and West Africa. Trainings will be delivered to governments, private transporters, non-governmental
 organizations, as well as to WFP and other UN agencies' staff and will cover topics including fleet management,
 workshop and spare parts management, maintenance, refrigerated transport operations for temperature-sensitive items
 and driver training.
- **Leverage the expertise** of private sector partners to enhance the knowledge and skills of logistics staff in the local transport sector and WFP operations.
- Align with current national and regional government policies setting higher road safety standards and fostering road transport sector development.

- 3. Increase awareness on road safety standards and driving practices.
- 4. Improve fleet management sustainability.
